# WALKING TO END POLIO

On Saturday October 19<sup>th</sup>, members of RC HK North Point joined forces with Rotarians from District 3450 at the Peak, to walk in support of End Polio Day.

This has been one of Rotary's greatest achievements and something to feel immensely proud of.

Rotary, the World Health Organisation, UNICEF and the Centres for Disease Control and Prevention launched the Global Polio Eradication Initiative in 1988. In 2007, the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation joined Rotary in its commitment to ending polio.

Since 2013, the Gates Foundation has matched every \$1 Rotary commits to polio eradication 2-to-1, up to \$35 million per year. Rotary, with matching funds from the Gates Foundation, has contributed more than \$1.6 billion to end polio.

Since we started the fight against polio, we've reduced the number of polio cases by 99.9 percent and reached more than 2.5 billion children with the vaccine.

There are fewer polio cases today than ever before, but we will not stop until we reach zero. If polio is not eradicated, hundreds of thousands of children could be paralysed. Global health care costs would rise dramatically, and many children's quality of life would be drastically diminished.

### Serving the community

Service Director Anne Loh has been working hard to line up some interesting ways for us to get involved in the community and start doing some good. We spoke with her about what's coming up and how we can all join in



### What will be our key areas of focus for service in this first year?

I think we should focus on serving youths from age 10-16, with a view to enlightening them with visions of career opportunities in the digital era. For example, how to become a KOL on You Tube, how to start a business via social media, robotic design, SMART life, electronic gaming. Topics like these where we know they will have an interest and where we have experienced people who can step in and help.

### We've talked about focusing on the North Point area, why is that important?

Well, since we have started our chapter in this area, we can engage NGOs, schools, and community groups naturally. It makes sense for us to begin by looking into our own neighbourhood.

### Are there any groups in need of help and support you have identified so far?

After contacting several NGOs in the North Point area, there is a large group of youths at the grass-root level lacking social resources and network ties. Although a number of young people are associated with community centres, they do not have a connection with professionals in the business sector. This is where we can help.

### How can members help, what areas of support will you be looking for?

I am looking for support from members of RC HK North point in the following ways:

- Befriend youths by volunteering as inspiring guest speakers, being academic advisors for college development, and mentors for career development
- Offer company visits, college visits, field trips, conference, and party experiences to our young friends in the area
- Organise training or workshops related to soft skills, social skills, and innovative ideas for youth

The community service team strives to sustain our members' participation in volunteering by design and deliver impactful services to our targeted beneficiary groups.

# NORTH POINT – A BRIEF HISTORY

What do we know about North Point, the home of our club? It's a fascinating area, full of historic corners and back alleys that tell stories from the past. The origins of North Point began way back in 1880, when the British Forces set up a battery there (military variety, not Duracell). With its deep water and high shoreline, it was an ideal location for shipping companies, warehouses and a quay. In 1919, Hong Kong Electric Company closed down the power station in Wan Chai and built a new one in North Point.

In 1921, a sugar refinery began to be built, but was later changed into a residential property because of the Canton-Hong Kong strike, in the area which is currently Chun Yeung Street. And in 1935, King's Road was opened to traffic and drove the development of this area. Thus, North Point became a new industrial district.

By 1950, North Point was the most populous area of the world, and during the early 1950s, was attracting settlers from various parts of China, including Shanghainese and from Fujian and Guangdong. Those early immigrants came to make Hong Kong their home town, and in order to support the family, they had no choice but to work hard and eventually become the basis for Hong Kong's economic take-off in the 1970s and 1980s. Consequently the ethnic groups in North Point are very strong. And although since those days the immigrants and their subsequent generations have become genuine Hong Kong people, their early life culture is still preserved in the streets and alleys.



The North Point district shares similar values with Rotary as an organisation, being societies that induced cultural fusion. In fact, the site of the City Garden Hotel where we meet was a location for Luna Park in North Point in the 1950s, and Rotary Club of Hong Kong hosted a charity ball at the same location. How is that for a connection?

"I am a freshman in the field of social services. My classification is in the field of training services, so, providing training courses to the public, such as baristas, florists, etc"


### About Rotary
